1. REPORT PURPOSE

1.1. This report seeks the Hearing Panel's consideration and decision on the objection lodged by against the classification off her dog, as a menacing dog under section 33A (2) of the Dog Control Act 1996 (the Act).

2. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- 2.1. A complaint was received on Wednesday 29th November 2023 07:43am. Police requested Animal Control's attendance on behalf of the dog owner.
- 2.2. The complainant states a dog has gone onto the property of either Road, however the owner is unable to retrieve it as all the neighbours have been trespassed from both Road.
- 2.3. At this time Animal Control were unable to attend, communication via text message were sent to explaining that we could not attend.
- 2.4. called at 11:11am to let us know that been on her property for about 3 hours and in that time had killed 25 Baby chickens and five adult chickens. The ones that survived were frightened and secured themselves up trees for safety. Animal Control staff asked if she knew where was now, and she said once she caught she had been on her property for about 3 hours and in that time had killed 25 Baby chickens and five adult chickens. - 2.5. Animal Control staff then asked if she could please write up a statement in her own words of what happened from when she first noticed the attack happening to when she dropped back to the chickens. Included Appendix A is statement and Appendix B is photo of one of her chickens that had been attacked and killed.
- 2.6. Council received contact from and on the 29th of November 2023, who are the property owners of as they saw on their CCTV footage, on their property early that morning and had heard what had happened. Council requested if they could please provide us with the CCTV footage, which they did send through on 1st December 2023. Screen shots taken from footage, included as Appendix C.

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2.7. Under Section 57 of the dog control act 1996, Dogs attacking person or animals (1) A person may, for the purpose of stopping an attack, seize or destroy a dog if- (b) the person witnessed the dog attacking any person, or stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.

- 2.8. After reviewing the footage and reading the statements and photos provided, and due to the extent of the attack the decision was made to classify as Menacing Under Section 33A (2) of the Dog Control Act 1996.
- 2.9. On 14th December 2023 Council sent the classification letter via mail to address.
- 2.10. The objection to the classification was received on the 22nd of December 2023. This is within the required timeframe legislated by the Act.
- 2.11. I have included a map of all three property's Appendix D
- 2.12. I have also included my Animal Control report Appendix E

3. OFFICER RECOMMENDATION

- 1. The Committee receive the report and,
- 2. In accordance with section 33B (2) of the Dog Control Act 1996 (committee) in considering the objection under subsection (1) may uphold or rescind the classification.
- The committee must have regard to
 - (a) the evidence which formed the basis for the classification; and
 - (b) any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals; and
 - (c) the matter relied on in support of the objection; and
 - (d) any other relevant matters.

4. CONCLUSION

- 4.1. The dog described as Tan with a black snout is a 1-year-old, Male Boxer named this dog is currently un-registered and has never been registered under his current owner's name.
- 4.2. Animal Management believe that this dog is a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of observed or reported behaviour of the dog in accordance with section 33A(1)(B)(I) of the Dog Control Act 1996

5. CONSIDERATION

- 5.1. Legal and Legislative Implications
- 5.2. Potential to prosecute:
- 5.3. There is evidential sufficiency for prosecution of the owner of the dog under the Dog Control Act Section 57.
- 5.4. The public interest in a prosecution is negligible.
- 5.5. Witness statement, photographic records of injuries and security video camera footage of the dog wondering are held on file.
- 5.6. The owner of the chickens has suffered loss of multiple pets. The owner of the dog is not taking responsibility for her dog's actions.

5.8.1. This decision is consistent with existing Council policies.

2. THE INCIDENT

- 2.1. On 29 November 2023 at 7:43 am Animal Control received a call from the Police through our call centre requesting us to attend a roaming dog.
- 2.2. The information that we received was, called the Police to help retrieve her dog. She explained that she was down the back of her property with him when he touched the electric fence and got a shock from it which made him run off her property and onto the neighbour's property and wonted assistance retrieving him from there.
- Council animal control after hours is for emergencies only, I decide to deal with this in my normal work hours.
- 2.4. Once I got to work at 8:30am I spoke to Regulatory Manager about the incident. At the time we didn't have the resources to attend this roaming dog report but also as the owner of the dog new where the dog was the decision was made not to attend.
- 2.5. At 9:34am I sent a text message communicating with her that we did not have the resources at the time to attend but if she was really concerned to contact the police as they can assist.
- 2.6. At 10.08am message back saying that "He's been chasing the neighbour's chickens. I can't win!!"
- 2.7. At 11:11am we received a call the Councils customer service team from

 Explaining that her neighbour's dog had come onto her property between the hours of 7am and 10am and had killed 25 Baby chickens and 4 Mother hens. I asked if if she had secured the dog and she said she did, but she rung the police and they told her to return the dog back to its owner (a) which she did. I asked if I could come out to take photos of the deceased chickens but by this time she had cleaned most of them up. I asked her to "in her own words" write a statement of what happened from the moment she noticed the attack to when she dropped the dog "back to his owner and provide any photos if she could.
- 2.8. I then received contact from who are the property owners of as they saw on their CCTV footage on their property early that morning and had heard what had happened. Council requested if they could please provide us with the CCTV footage.
- 2.9. 30th November 2023 a Snap send solve was sent through to Council from with a description of what had happened the day before and also a photo of one of her dead chickens. She also provided a statement.
- 2.10. While I was investigating further the incident, I noticed that under there were no dogs registered. At 11:20am on the 30th of November 2023 I sent a text message to asking if she could please provide registration and micro-chip details. The messaged me back at 4:28pm asking me to provide an email address for correspondence to be sent to as she would like to send a letter outlining her position as she was very concerned about the situation with her puppy. I sent through my work email address; she responded asking if it needs to go to my supervisor in which I responded with the Regulatory Managers email address. I got a thumbs up emoji back.
- 2.11. 1st of December 2023 CCTV footage had been sent via email from which once we reviewed it, you could clearly see roaming at 7:43am on the 29th of November 2023.

NOTICE OF CLASSIFICATION OF DOG AS MENACING DOG

- 1 I am writing in response to the notice I received: classification of dog as menacing dog.
- I sent an email on the 18 December 2023, questioning the validity of two dog infringement notices I received. I am yet to receive a response back on this matter.
- From my basic understanding, an infringement notice must be accurately correct for it to be enforceable. A speeding fine infringement must be precise with time of incident, dates, car registration etc. for it to be enforceable.
- I believe your dog infringement notices were invalid as the details were not precise, therefore, not enforceable. With no response received from the Grey District Council I am unclear as to what your position is on this matter.
- I have sent a follow up email as I wish to appeal infringement notices
- The latest notice appears to be in retaliation to the email I sent questioning the Grey District Councils validity of infringement notices
- 7 The latest notice I received refers to 'the dog' as 'Tan and Black male -
- 8 This letter is my formal written notice (under Section 33B, Dog Control Act 1996).
- 9 I am objecting to the Notice of classification of dog as menacing dog, on the grounds of:
 - I. Description of dog colouring. That is **not** the dog.
 - II. Description of the dog breed. That is not the dog.
 - III. Property address is invalid based on Grey District Councils own internal systems. That is not my address.
 - IV. The dog has been rehomed.
 - V. The Grey District Council has not acted in an impartial manner.

Grey District Council Notice of classification of dog as menacing dog

Section 33A, Dog Control Act 1996



We have Classified after the incident that happened between the hours of 7am and 10am on the 29th of November 2023 which resulted in several chickens getting killed.

This is to notify you that this dog has been classified as a menacing dog under section 33A(2) of the Dog Control Act 1996.

This is because the Grey District Council considers your dog may pose a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife, because of reported behaviour of the dog.

A summary of the effect of the classification and your right to object is provided below.



Effect of classification as menacing dog
Sections 33E, 33F, and 36A, Dog Control Act 1996

must not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction; and

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- (b) must, if required by the Grey District Council, produce to the Grey District Council, within 1 month after receipt of this notice, a certificate issued by a registered veterinary surgeon certifying—
 - (i) that the dog is or has been neutered; or
 - (ii) that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
- (c) where a certificate under paragraph (b)(ii) is produced to the Grey District Council, produce to the Grey District Council, within I month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate under paragraph (b)(i).

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above.

A dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and remove the dog from you if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (c) above. The officer or ranger may keep the dog until you demonstrate that you are willing to comply with paragraphs (a) to (c).

As from 1 July 2006, you are also required, for the purpose of providing permanent identification of the dog, to arrange for the dog to be implanted with a functioning microchip transponder. This must be confirmed by making the dog available to the Grey District Council in accordance with the reasonable instructions of the Grey District Council for verification that the dog has been implanted with a functioning microchip transponder of the prescribed type and in the prescribed location.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this requirement—

- within 2 months from 1 July 2006 if your dog is classified as menacing on or after 1 December 2003 but before 1 July 2006; or
- within 2 months after the dog is classified as menacing if your dog is classified as menacing after 1 July 2006.

If the dog is in the possession of another person for a period not exceeding 72 hours, you must advise that person of the requirement to not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction. You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500 if you fail to comply with this requirement.

Full details of the effect of the classification of a dog as menacing are provided in the Dog Control Act 1996.

Right of objection to classification under section 33A Section 33B, Dog Control Act 1996

You may object to the classification of your dog as menacing by lodging with the Grey District Council a written objection within 14 days of receipt of this notice setting out the grounds on which you object.

You have the right to be heard in support of your objection and will be notified of the time and place at which your objection will be heard.

Since property is not fully fenced, the dog is usually tied to a long lead outside on a fine day to prevent the dog from escaping of the 3 property. The lead is also sufficiently long to allow the dog to come inside to sleep on its mat whilst still being kept on a secured lead. On bad weather days, the dog is primarily kept inside. As some often works from home, she will take the dog out on the lead for toileting purposes as necessary throughout the day.
