I am in my seventieth year and use a walker. The extra 3km would trouble me. Not everyone has a car.

We want to be a thriving connected and resilient Grey District says the headlines more than once. Yeah! Right!

The Club, not the Grey District Council provide once weekly transport to the Super Markets for which I am grateful.

On occasion I have visited the hospital up to 5 times a fortnight for treatment to say nothing of appointments for the likes of hearing aids. With taxis fares around \$60 return to the hospital I am fortunate to have people interested

in my welfare to provide me with transport. Unlike Christchurch for example which has a good bus service Goy District provides nothing

I choose to live in Punanga. It has been a good life. If there is a problem it is the forced amalgamation with Greymsouth from appearances unlike the Westport - Reefton relationship. We are a similar distance to Reefton away from Westport. I wonder how we would have fared.

Your headlines on page 3, Throwing, Connected and Resilient Goy District area had joke. Your answer is to put up rates 9.9% and wipe services like the swimming baths and service centre with library and post office to pay for a series of costly council balls ups with no accountability

I have no confidence in the Goy District Council and if health permits I will be writing the Minister expressing my dismay and quoting newspaper reports of just some of their balls ups

in the hope that she will appoint an understudy to investigate

Before amalgamation Runanga was a small tidy independent community. Unlike others in the merger it had money in the bank and good services like sewerage, water, etc. While associated with Gouymouth it will go down and rates climb.

The best that community (Gouymouth) can hope for is the alpine fault to rupture and claim from their earthquake insurance

I don't think council has built a footpath in the Runanga area since amalgamation 30 plus years ago. Repave has gone yet they built one at Jellyman Park against expert NIWA advice who were proven right when the sea destroyed their plans. This mistake cost a fortune and nobody held accountable

I wonder the complete cost of the lemon dredge and so the list goes on.

Greymouth High School Students Submission to the Long Term Plan 2021-2031

On the 11th March, Staff from the Grey District Council undertook engagement with students at Greymouth High School for their input into the Long Term Plan 2021-2031.

The students were given the opportunity to give their thoughts on the Big Issues that Council has in the Long Term Plan, as well as provide any other information they wished.

This is what the students said:

Extension of kerbside refuse and recycling collection to all of Greymouth

Overwhelming response in favour of extending the refuse and recycling collection throughout the Grey District. There were 45 comments received about wanting the service extended.

Comments include the following:

- More recycling is always good
- Extend the bin service to Runanga and all other places so we shouldn't have to use more plastic to get rid of rubbish
- Extend the bin service to Runanga and all other places so we shouldn't have to use more plastic to get rid of rubbish
- Extend service area. Would be nice to have recycling
- More recycling and rubbish bins in Taylorville
- Recycling bins in Gladstone
- More rubbish bins be sick

New Library

Of the 46 comments we received, 30 of the students were in favour of building the new library and 16 of the students were not in favour.

Comments include the following:

- Yes, to all of these. These solutions seem to be a positive change for the community
- Bigger library be mean
- Bigger library x 7
- Bean bags at the library
- Library is fine, might need to be modernized
- Instead of new library, make building in Greymouth earthquake proof
- Library in Greymouth is fine, we don't need a new one

Delivery of Spring Creek Pool Service and Runanga Service Centre and Community Library

The students were mainly engaged in the topics of the extension of recycling and the new library, as issues they are directly interested in. There was little response to these issues and 1 wanted the Runanga Library fixed.

Other issues, concerns and ideas that were raised by the students at the engagement session:

- Update Paroa storm water drains on main road
- Bins around shops/Countdown and Warehouse
- New bins in town, mostly areas that have the most rubbish
- Yes, we should put more bins out mostly on bike tracks

- Add more tourist attractions; stuff to do around town
- Can you please add more and fix the toilets around Greymouth
- Build/fund a new rugby stadium or grandstand

Active West Coast

Active West Coast (AWC) is a network of agencies and groups committed to improving the health and wellbeing of West Coasters through the promotion of healthy lifestyles and the creation of healthy social and physical environments. While member organisations were involved in preparing this submission, the recommendations in their entirety, do not necessarily reflect the views of each individual agency.

The World Health Organisation, as part of its Healthy Communities initiative, has stated that:

People in a healthy community enjoy a clean, safe physical environment, including:

- adequate housing
- a responsible use of resources sustainable for the long term
- strong, mutually supportive networks
- high levels of participation and control over decisions affecting health and wellbeing
- adequate access to food, water, shelter, income, safety, and recreation
- programmes for promoting health, preventing disease, and limiting the ill effects of disability
- a chance for a wide variety of contact, interaction and communication, including educational experiences
- a diverse, vital and innovative local economy
- a strong local cultural and spiritual heritage, and
- access to quality health services.

We acknowledge the importance of Council's huge role in creating a healthy environment in which its residents can live, grow, learn, thrive, play and work.

Vision and Community Outcomes

We applaud Council's Strategic Vision for a 'thriving, connected and resilient Grey District' as this implies the district residents will reside in safe, inclusive, and well designed and connected communities that support health and well-being. Provision of clean water, efficient roading and safe pedestrian/cycle networks, and effective sewerage and solid waste systems all benefit health. Additionally, Council can further enhance the well-being of its residents by creating effective alcohol policies, designating Smokefree public spaces and providing opportunities for young people to be involved in decision making.

Smokefree Environments

AWC congratulates the Grey District Council for incorporating Smokefree & Vapefree into their Outdoor Dining Policy in 2019. This inclusion will benefit the health and wellbeing of Grey District residents and visitors and is an indication of support for the Government-endorsed goal of a Smokefree New Zealand by 2025. The aim of Smokefree 2025 is for smoking rates to decrease from the current 13.2% (17% within the Grey District) of all adults to fewer than 5%. Reducing the visibility of tobacco products and smoking, and supporting smokers to quit are also important elements of the Smokefree 2025 goal.

Council policies are useful tools to improve the health and wellbeing of communities and the wider population. To further protect people from the harms of smoking we encourage Council to review and extend its Smokefree Public Places Policy to include the following:

- Vaping/Vapefree in all instances. This will be in line with the new Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products Act 1990, Council's own Outdoor Dining Policy, and similar policies of other Councils across New Zealand. Vaping is a quitting tool and is not intended for use by non-smokers or ex-smokers, so its inclusion will help prevent the uptake of vaping by young people and non-smokers and decrease normalisation.
- Endorsement of the intentions of the goal of a SmokeFree Aotearoa 2025
- Explicitly include entrances/exits of Council-owned buildings. This extension would further protect people from harm by decreasing visibility of tobacco products and smoking, and exposure to second-hand smoke.

The Smokefree Public Places policy provides a valuable opportunity to reduce the visibility of smoking in our community. We consider the following steps are required to further implement the policy:

- identifying areas that would benefit from having more visible Smokefree signage,
- agreeing on the look of any proposed signage, stickers or stencils,
- installing Smokefree signage,
- keeping the community informed about the Smokefree spaces through a variety of channels including media articles, social media, items in the GDC newsletters and on the GDC website, discussions with business owners, the Business & Promotions Association, Tourism West Coast, etc.

Our member organisations are happy to work with the Council to assist with implementing the policy and to provide advice and assistance on Smokefree matters, including support with signage.

Youth development

We have for some time recommended that Council initiate a Youth Development Strategy because young people who feel valued and are engaged are more positive, mentally well and healthy, and achieve to a higher standard than those who feel less connected; which has benefits to the wider community. We believe Council has a role in creating environments that value and support young people, and involving them in decisions that affect them and their futures. Youth led planning and a commitment to a strategy by Council, and other agencies, will be essential to retaining young people in the district and enabling them to achieve their potential.

We recommend that Council initiates a Youth Development Strategy for the Grey District and we offer our support in its development.

We also recommend comprehensive consultation with young people, and youth engagement in the development of the Strategy. We are aware that Council already works with the Grey District Youth Trust, as well as supporting and engaging with Youth Sector meetings and funding and working with the Future Leaders Programme.

Climate change, biodiversity and planning for sustainability

The effects of climate change have potential impacts on many aspects of the lives of people within the Grey District and particularly on Council provided services. It is expected that our district will experience wetter winters and springs with autumn rains increasing by 21% by 2090. Increased temperatures will mean another ten days with temperatures above 25°C. More frequent storms will also threaten coastlines and low-lying areas.

We are therefore pleased to see that Council is planning for the effects of climate change with respect to land use, transport and infrastructure. We also support the

process under the Te Tai o Poutini Plan that will ensure communities in vulnerable areas will be involved in climate change response decisions that will affect them.

Physical activity opportunities

Lack of physical activity is now a major cause of illness and death both nationally and globally. Creating environments that encourage and support people to be active is therefore an investment in community wellbeing. We acknowledge Council's ongoing support for Sport Canterbury West Coast, as this organisation assists members of the community to be more active more often.

Cycling

We congratulate Council on its continued support of the Westland Wilderness Trail. This trail has supported many residents to become more physically active. The trail and the new Paparoa Track have attracted many domestic visitors to our area. The West Coast area is becoming known as a 'cycle-trail must-do area'; this will continue to benefit our local economy and may also result in people choosing to come and live here.

However, in order to strengthen our cycle-trail connectivity, our local road network needs to be more cycle friendly. The increase in heavy freight vehicles on local roads and state highways can be a barrier to people choosing to cycle if adequate cycle lanes are not provided. Many people travel relatively short distances to work and much of this could be undertaken by cycle if the road environment and community culture was more cycle-friendly. There is also a need for more prominent cycle-parks within the district, especially within the CBD.

We encourage Council to provide cycle lanes and other relevant cycle infrastructure when undertaking road renewals or town development projects.

Walking

Accessible and well-maintained footpaths provide opportunities for people of all ages to be active and connect with their community. The aging population of the Grey District is likely to increase demand for new and improved footpaths. We are therefore pleased to see that Council has significantly increased funding for annual footpath renewals.

Creating pedestrian-friendly spaces has a range of community benefits, from increased road safety to better health and economic outcomes. Walk 21 has developed the attached International Charter for Walking to help authorities create policies, activities and relationships to develop a culture where people choose to walk. We encourage Council to become a signatory to this Charter to show its commitment to walking as a key indicator of healthy, efficient, socially inclusive and

sustainable communities. For more information and an outline of how each of the principles can be enacted please see www.walk21.com.

CBD and environs

We were pleased to see in a recent media article that Council is nearing completion of its discussions with NZ Rail and NZTA regarding the redesign of the entrance to the CBD at Tainui and Smith Street. We trust this will include adequate provision for pedestrian travel in the area as it is currently very hard to negotiate. As we said in our submission on the last previous LTP, it would also be timely to tidy up the area on Smith Street running into the intersection. This area is often the first introduction a visitor has to Māwhera/Greymouth and in its current form it is neither tidy nor inviting. We suggest that it would be relatively simple to make the area more walking friendly and attractive. The walking path off the Cobden Bridge down to Mawhera Quay should also be included in a tidy-up, as it is very slippery when wet. The blank concrete wall could also be enhanced with art.





Road safety and accessible transport

We endorse Council’s role in the promotion of road safety and accessible transport through its continued membership of the West Coast Road Safety Committee and its support of the Total Mobility programme.

Solid waste (refuse and recycling)

We acknowledge Council is under constant pressure with respect to its solid waste management activities. We support Council’s intention to extend kerbside refuse

and recycling to other areas in the district and to introduce specific glass recycling bins to areas receiving the kerbside service. This should help prevent recyclable materials from entering the landfill.

We are aware Council supports the Enviroschools programme under its waste minimisation activities. We encourage Council to continue its support of this programme as it will assist those involved to make positive changes with respect to the physical environment and waste minimisation practices.

We thank Council for its continued support for the 'Enviroschools' initiative within the Grey District.

Alcohol

The misuse of alcohol continues to harm individuals, whanau and the wider Grey District community. We encourage Council to work with Buller and Westland Councils, and other stakeholders, to create a formal mechanism such as a Joint Local Alcohol Policy to ensure a consistent Coast-wide approach to both alcohol licensing and regulation with the goal of reducing alcohol-related harm within our communities.

Gambling

We are aware that Council's TAB Board Venues and Class 4 Gaming Venues Policies are up for review later this year. In 2019 \$10 000 a day was lost to Class 4 Gaming Machines within the Grey District. Our member organisations would be happy to assist Council in the review of these policies.

Property and housing

We commend Council for its provision of pensioner housing as affordable housing is important to older people's wellbeing.

Community facilities and events

We support Council's provision of community facilities and events as this enhances the well-being of residents and the experience of visitors to the district. We support the activities included in this section, and make the following comments:

Libraries and Museums

Provision of libraries and museums supports life-long learning and offers residents the opportunity to extend their knowledge about 'their place' which assists with community connectedness. We support the intention to provide a library that will meet the future needs of the Grey District. As indicated in the draft LTP the current library is limited in the services it can provide. Libraries and library services have evolved and libraries are now a place of active

learning, community connection and creativity. The development of areas such as a 'make-a-space' where people can learn, create and interact with technologies such as 3-D printers, laser cutters and even old looms will enhance accessibility and support employment options. We support the inclusion of museum displays within the library. We would also like to see an active play area within the building or sited alongside the library.

Swimming Pools

Swimming pools support well-being through provision of physical activity opportunities and through the 'Learn to swim' programmes. We congratulate Council for decreasing entry fees for community card holders as fees are often a barrier to many in our population.

We acknowledge Council's need to consult on the future of Runanga Pool. Feedback from a small discussion with community members has indicated that the pool patronage could be improved with better opening times and targeting. For example, running of events in the past has brought people into the area, and beyond, to the pool. The pool has also been the back-stop facility when the pool at the Westland Recreation Centre has been out of action. While we supported the development of the Regional Sports Facility Plan we are concerned that some people in Runanga may be not be able to afford the entry fee and travel cost to use the pool at the Recreation Centre. We are also concerned that the community may not have the capacity to take over and run the pool as suggested in the LTP. Prior to making a long-term decision we suggest it may be beneficial for Council to work with the community to see how it (Council) can improve its service delivery with the pool and meet community needs before deciding to divest itself of the facility.

Heritage, Arts and Culture

We commend Council for its ongoing support of heritage, arts and culture within the district. These activities enhance cultural wellbeing and creativity, and are integral features of a healthy and vibrant community.

We congratulate Council on the reopening of the pop-up museum in its new venue as this supports community identity and sense of place. We are aware that the previous pop-up museum attracted both locals and visitors to find out more about our local stories.

Parks and Tracks

The provision of well-maintained parks and tracks supports wellbeing as it increases opportunities to be physically active, develop skills and to 'commune with nature'. We encourage Council to undertake accessibility

audits for its children's playgrounds and parks to identify physical barriers that prevent meaningful engagement for users of all ages and abilities. We are also aware that the shade review undertaken recently across playgrounds in New Zealand shows playgrounds in the Grey District require more shade to protect users from the risks of sun exposure. Findings from an accessibility audit and the shade review could assist Council with future planning and maintenance of its parks and playgrounds. Our members are happy to assist Council with this.

Public toilets

We support the provision of new toilets at Mitchells and improvements to the toilets at Iveagh Bay. This will make these areas more attractive and safer for visitors to these recreation areas.

We have previously submitted in support of upgrades to the toilets at Anzac Park, however, we are aware that no upgrade has taken place. Karoro Domain is another area that is frequently used for sport and recreation which has no public toilet facilities. Both areas are very well used throughout the year, and access to fit for purpose public toilets would improve amenity and protect the health of the users.

We recommend Council include the previously proposed upgrade of Anzac Park toilets early within the LTP.

We recommend Council consider including public toilet facilities at Karoro Domain.

Food security

Members of Active West Coast are part of the West Coast Food Security network and have been involved in developing the start of a response plan to improve food security on the West Coast.

Food security means having access to a variety of nutritious food that is safe, meets cultural needs and supports active healthy lifestyles. Being well nourished leads to improved health and wellbeing. However, one in four New Zealand children are not currently food secure and local qualitative research indicates a similar situation for the West Coast.

The West Coast Food Security Network have been working on local research (a report with recommendations is due out in 2021); connecting existing sustainable initiatives across the West Coast such as community edible gardens and other food supply initiatives; and strengthening support for people who require more food on a daily or weekly basis. Active West Coast recommends that Council considers some of

the recommendations from the local research that will be out later in 2021. We invite Council to re-connect with the Food Security Network to support future food security initiatives for the West Coast.

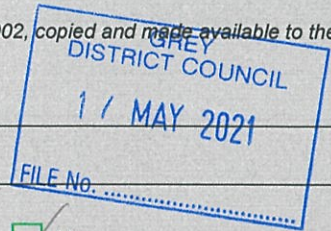

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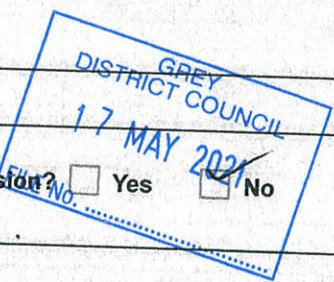

I have been waiting patiently for a proposal such as those relating to the ‘new’ Greymouth library to appear, particularly as it concerns the replacement or continuation of the Pioneer Library (established post 1960 West Coast Centennial Celebrations) and the former archival role of “History House” (closed 2017).

The ‘new’ library needs to expand on the provision of this facet of library activity in a comprehensive way and potentially become the ‘Turnbull Library of the West Coast’.

Due to “arrangements “made in 1960, Grey District archival material was “shipped “to Hokitika. This appears to have stopped when History House was established. History House became the Grey District repository. Proposals over the last decade or so concerning the location and staffing of a West Coast Archive have not been advanced. A new building is a great opportunity for Greymouth to fulfil an important archival library role in addition to the adoption of the new technologies and provision for the social and educational functions as indeed History House did.

The ‘new’ library with archival contents and service fits with the concept of a library as a destination in its own right. Counsellors and staff, both District and

Regional, will be aware of their legal responsibility to preserve the archives of the institutions to which they belong.

Over the last fifty or sixty years, particularly the last thirty, I have acquired a personal library relating to the West Coast Region- a regional history has yet to be written. Much of my collection and research has been focused on the Grey District Coalfield and includes irreplaceable Primary source material. Books relating to the Brunner disaster, the Brunnerton District and the Blackball strike have been written (others are a work in progress). I would like to bequeath my collection to the Grey District but would also like to know they were in institutional care and that the materials were available to researchers. I am aware of other individuals and institutions with important Grey District Primary source material that might have similar concerns. A 'new' library could include in its constitutional undertaking provisions to ensure the security of its archival material. I'm sure that Central Government assistance would be available to facilitate some of this provision.

Essentially my submission is in support for the 'new' library and the need for it to make provision for archival material relating to the Grey District and the West Coast Region.

There are only two swimming pools serviced by the Grey District Council, why not keep them both.

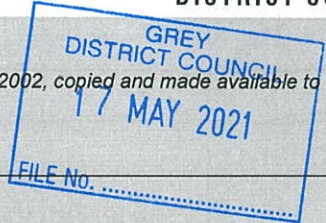

The Runanga Swimming Pool

While I understand the \$60,000 cost in operating the Runanga Pool is a burden for the GDC, it is providing important life skills for the children of Runanga and its surrounds. These are potentially lifesaving skills that the children have gained through becoming competent in the water and learning how to swim at the local pool. What price do you put on a life ?

Rather than rushing through the consultation process for the 2021/2031 LTP and kicking Runanga in the guts again by wanting to close the pool and service centre, please take some time to carefully consider what other options are available that may provide a solution.

I have ticked option 2 for both the swimming pool and service centre for targeted rates, plus dot marked option 3 for general rates.

I believe funding should come from multiple sources and supplemented with operational cost saving measures This would include targeted rates (Runanga), general rates (Greymouth area), possible use of the Pool Trust/Council Reserve funds, maybe through the school some Ministry of Education support, plus using the Runanga Service Centre staff, based in Runanga, for some of the pool work required (monitoring/maintenance) throughout the year.

When looking at operational returns it would be good to look at patronage of the pool. Swimming numbers are noticeably down compared to when the new pool was open in 2011 and hugely down when the old pool was in operation. Why is this ?

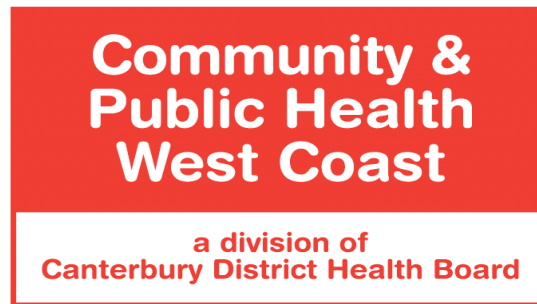
Perhaps a survey could be undertaken through the school for feedback from the children and their families on swimming numbers and how the pool is operated/swimming times. We know that the school role is currently down compared to past years, but there seems to be a lot of properties selling quickly in the town. Are there new people residing here, and if so will the school role numbers build up again ?

There are too many options and unknowns to straight-out ditch the swimming pool facility and Service Centre. Have it as part of the LTP to investigate the opportunities to keep these Runanga amenities open and help attract 'new blood' to the town. Please do not shut them down after just one month's consultation – Runanga deserves better than that.

Introduction

Community and Public Health West Coast is a regional office of the Community and Public Health Division of the Canterbury District Health Board and provides a regional public health service to the West Coast. We welcome the opportunity to comment on the Grey District Council's Draft Long Term Plan 2021-2031.

The goal of our organisation is that of improving and protecting the health and well-being of the people of the West Coast. However, while health care services are an important determinant of health, health is also influenced by a wide range of factors beyond the health sector.

The Dahlgren and Whitehead 1991 model below illustrates how individuals are influenced by factors that generally lie outside their control. These factors; often referred to as the social determinants of health and well-being, can be described as the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age; they are affected by environmental, social and behavioural factors.

As depicted in the diagram, the sphere of influence is very wide and, in many instances, beyond the health sector. Furthermore, changes in any of these factors can affect health and wellbeing dramatically (both positively and negatively). In order to maximise people's wellbeing, these factors need to be taken into account by policy and decision makers, including Councils. The Long Term Plan provides Grey District Council with an opportunity to influence the determinants of health for the people of the Grey District through prioritising funds for activities that support health and wellbeing.



Another way to incorporate wellbeing into Council's decision making and planning is to use the 5 Ways to Wellbeing. The five ways are a set of evidence-based public health messages aimed at improving the mental health and general wellbeing of the whole population.



New Zealand research has found that the five **Ways to Wellbeing** are all strongly associated with higher wellbeing. People experienced higher levels of wellbeing when they:

- were connected socially with others (**Me whakawhanaunga-Connect**)
- gave time and resources to others (**Tukua-Give**)
- were able to appreciate and take notice of things around them (**Me aro tonu-Take notice**)
- were learning new things in their lives (**Me ako tonu-Keep learning**)
- were physically active (**Me kori tonu-Be Active**)

These five ways are being used by councils in the UK to build stronger communities:

'It is conscious planning in a way that will actually promote wellbeing. If we have wellbeing in mind at the point of planning we have a better chance of building resilience in communities to enable them to survive in difficult times.' (Ashton, Leigh and Wigan PCT in the Five ways to wellbeing, New application, new ways of thinking 2011) p.30

Investing in wellbeing benefits more than just the individual. For example people who report higher levels of wellbeing tend to be more involved in social and civic life, are more likely to behave in environmentally responsible ways, have better family and social relationships at home and are more productive at work. (*Five ways to wellbeing, New application, new ways of thinking 2011*) p.6

However, we also acknowledge that rises in rates will have an inequitable impact on disadvantaged populations, particularly older people and people on fixed incomes. We envisage that there may be an uptake of the Grey District Council Rates Postponement Policy.</p>	
<p>Climate Change</p>	<p>CPH is pleased to see that Council has acknowledged the potential impacts of climate change with respect to its land transport and storm water infrastructure. Models suggest that the Grey District will be wetter over time with increased flooding events that may cause damage to land and infrastructure. It also highlights the need to plan and develop options for how those currently living in vulnerable areas will be supported to either mitigate the risk of remaining in place or consider relocating.</p> <p>We are therefore pleased to see that under the Te Tai o Poutini Plan, a process is being created for Councils on the West Coast to identify hazard areas, undertake community consultation, and develop appropriate responses to protect communities and infrastructure from the effects of climate change.</p>

<p>Land Transport</p>	<p>We support Council’s actions under this section as a safe and reliable land transport network is essential to economic and community wellbeing.</p> <p>We are pleased to see Council has secured Provincial Growth Funding (PGF) to replace the Moonlight Creek, Rough River, and William Stewart bridges. We also support continued investment in bridge renewals and maintenance to comply with current bridge standards and seismic risk. We recognise that the investment to achieve the increased standards means higher capacity freight vehicles will become more common on our road network. This has implications for safety of road users, particularly cyclists and pedestrians, motorcyclists and novice and older drivers. To enhance safety for cyclists we encourage Council to provide identifiable cycle lanes when undertaking road renewals.</p> <p>We support the proposal to provide a heavy vehicle access route to the Port as this will improve the potential for a sea-based freight option. Taking freight off the roading network can assist in reducing harmful green-house gas emissions.</p> <p>We support Council’s continued involvement in the West Coast Road Safety Programme. This is an effective way for stakeholders to work together to protect the health and wellbeing of its residents. We also acknowledge Council for its continued support of the West Coast Wilderness Trail. This asset supports many residents to be physically active and continues to attract many domestic tourists to our area.</p>	<p>We support Council’s continued investment in both the Road Safety Programme and Westland Wilderness Trail.</p>

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	<p>While no explanation was provided regarding the \$1.6million financial investment (Years 1 to 3) in the Shantytown Cycle Trail we assume this funding is also available via the PGF. This trail has potential to attract tourists and events to the area and will be another avenue for recreational physical activity for residents.</p> <p>As we have previously submitted, the existence of a safe and well-maintained footpath network is essential to the safety and wellbeing of the districts' residents, particularly for older people, people with disabilities and children. Footpaths encourage people to be active and connect with, and feel part of, their local community. We are therefore very encouraged to see Council has signalled a significantly increased footpath maintenance and renewals budget (page E20) of \$500 000 per annum as this has capacity to create a marked difference in footpath quality and resident satisfaction. However, the budget line for footpath renewals on page E27 shows \$70 000 for 2021 and nothing over \$32 000 for the remaining years of the draft LTP. This is confusing to the reader who might expect to see the signalled spend included in this line. As discussed on page E20, previous LTP funding was \$80 000 for maintenance and \$240 000 for renewals. The way the draft is set out, it appears that the budget has actually decreased.</p> <p>Investment in well-designed and well-maintained active transport facilities greatly assists the population to be active. Having a physically active population not only protects individual physical health, it also has positive impacts on mental wellbeing, economic productivity, learning and community resilience.</p>	<p>We support Council's intention to invest in footpath renewals across the life of this Plan.</p>
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3 Waters:

- **Stormwater**
- **Waste water**
- **Water supply**

We support Council's decision to address the backlog in deferred renewals within the 3 Waters, particularly stormwater, over the life of this Plan. Failing to address the backlog will put community and environmental wellbeing at risk and place an undue financial burden on future rate payers.

We congratulate Council for previously undertaking condition assessments of this infrastructure and are pleased Council is using that data to prioritise activities to upgrade these assets and improve their resilience.

We agree that without significant investment, the stormwater system will fail to protect communities from flooding and potentially risk public health. We support the general upgrades listed under stormwater activities. We have previously submitted on the need to address storm water upgrades within the central Greymouth and surrounding area and are pleased to see this has been included within the Plan.

We endorse Council's investment in wastewater infrastructure within the district over the last few years as this has benefitted our residents and the environment. We support the need for Council to investigate and assess potential future demand for both its wastewater and water supply activities and for signalling future community consultation will possibly be undertaken in the next LTP.

We agree that addressing deferred renewals within the water supply should assist with water leakage, however, Council could also undertake a community awareness raising project to highlight the need to conserve the district's potable water.

Solid waste

We agree that solid waste management is necessary for the health and quality of life of the community, the local economy and the environment.

We support the intention to extend kerbside refuse and recycling collection to other areas of the District and the provision of a separate crate for glass recycling for all areas that have kerbside collection. With respect to the proposed change to the type of plastic that will be accepted for recycling, it is imperative that comprehensive awareness raising is undertaken to prevent unintentional contamination that would prevent the materials that are collected from being recycled.

We note that there have been recent media articles about private landfill sites within the district where potentially contaminated demolition waste has been dumped (and may be in breach of resource consents). While we understand the volume of demolition waste is increasing, it is imperative that any private landfill is sufficiently contained to prevent spread of any contaminants and that they operate in compliance with consent conditions.

We are also aware that due to the COVID lockdown and the recent fire in the recycling centre that much of the waste collected in the yellow bins has been, and is still, going to landfill. This is putting unexpected pressure on the landfill cell and may necessitate investigation into a possible new cell in the near future.

Many communities across New Zealand (and indeed the world) have Council supported reuse and recycling areas where unwanted items are donated, sorted and chosen by others to take away for re-use. This circular economy model is a way to reduce, recycle and reuse,

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	<p>and can significantly reduce the amount of waste going to landfills. This has positive outcomes for ratepayers and the environment. We are aware that Council has a small operation like this at McLeans Landfill. However, there is huge potential to grow a better model and we encourage Council to consider how it can (with other stakeholders) grow its operation to a point that it substantially assists in addressing the District's waste management issues. <p>Environmental Services</p>	<p>We support Council's intention to provide adequate resource to carry out Environmental Services activities which contribute to a safe, healthy and sustainable environment.</p> <p>We particularly support the activities associated with Emergency Management. The increased frequency of storm events and the recent report upgrading the potential for an alpine fault rupture highlight the need for communities to be prepared. However, we are aware that a growing number of people in our community are living week-to-week and, despite any desire to do so, are not able to adequately prepare for such an event. We encourage Council to include actions to address this in its emergency preparedness plans. Such actions could include support for food production on public land and support for food rescue/redistribution project to help build food</p>	<p>We support Council's intention to provide adequate resource to carry out Environmental Services activities</p>

This could also have the effect of preventing food waste going to the landfill (see comment under Food Security below)</p> <p>We are happy to work with Council to assist with emergency management issues around welfare, drinking water, prevention of disease outbreaks and other issues of public health importance.</p> <p><u>Class 4 Gaming and TAB Policies</u></p> <p>We note that Council's Class 4 Gambling and TAB Venue Policies are up for review later this year. The recent BERL: Assessment of the effects of Class 4 gambling on Wellbeing in New Zealand Final report May 2020 concluded that '<i>Class 4 gambling has a tendency to magnify community disadvantage. The evidence strongly suggests that it transfers wealth from more deprived communities to less deprived communities.</i>' The Grey District has a high number of gaming venues and machines compared with the rest of New Zealand and consequently, we also have a relatively high expenditure on the machines. In 2019 the Grey District lost \$3.6m (\$10 000 a day) in 'pokie' machines. The BERL report's findings suggest that our most vulnerable communities are further disadvantaged by Class 4 Gaming. This is alarming given that six of the nine Class 4 venues in our district are situated in medium-high or high deprivation areas. We offer Council our assistance with review of these policies.</p> <p><u>Local Alcohol Policy</u></p> <p>As we have stated in previous submissions, alcohol is a psychoactive substance that continues to cause significant harm in our community. For example, alcohol was a factor in 34% of fatal and serious injury crashes on West Coast roads between 2016 and 2020.</p>	<p>We offer Council our assistance with its review of the Class 4 Gaming and TAB policies.</p>
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	<p>Local alcohol policies are a tool which can help to address alcohol-related harm in our communities. We understand that Council has been unwilling to proceed further on the development of a Local Alcohol Policy (LAP), at least in part because of the very real prospect of legal challenge from the alcohol industry. We continue to encourage Council to consider the development of a joint LAP with the two other West Coast District Councils as a way of sharing this risk. A joint LAP would also have benefits for the local hospitality industry by bringing consistency to licensing requirements across the Coast and a “level playing field” for new entrants to these industries, regardless of where they set up on the Coast. A joint LAP would be supported by NZ Police and the Medical Officer of Health as reporting agencies.</p> <p>We acknowledge Council is displaying liquor licence public notices on their website and are no longer publishing applications in print media. However, to ensure equitable access for people wishing to view alcohol licence applications and, where appropriate, make objections, we suggest Council also includes an electronic copy of the full application with appropriate redactions. We also suggest Council posts the public notices on its social media page (such as Facebook). We are aware that other councils within New Zealand utilise social media as well as their websites to fully inform residents of liquor licensing applications.</p> <p><u>Smokefree Environments</u></p> <p>Community and Public Health congratulates the Grey District Council for incorporating Smokefree and Vapefree into their Outdoor Dining Policy in 2019 with the requirement to display signage. Reducing the visibility of tobacco products and smoking, and supporting smokers to quit, are important elements of the Smokefree 2025 goal.</p> <p>The number of people who smoke is decreasing, however, we are still not on track to achieve Smokefree Aotearoa 2025 where less than 5% of the population smoke. The 2018 Census indicated that 13.2% New Zealanders aged 15+ years are regular smokers. However, here on the West Coast the rate is significantly higher at 18.1% with the rate for GDC at 17%, consequently our population continues to suffer more from smoking-related harm.</p> <p>Policy is a good intervention to improve the health and wellbeing of communities and the wider population. To further protect people from the harms of smoking we encourage Council to review and extend its Smokefree Public Places Policy (SPP), to include the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Vaping/Vapefree in all instances. These events enhance community wellbeing and connectedness. <p>Commercial & Property</p>	<p><u>Aerodrome</u> We agree the aerodrome is an important strategic asset that provides</p>	

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	<p>for commercial, private and health-based aircraft transport. We support Council's intention to maintain the aerodrome to ensure safe and convenient use.</p> <p><u>Port of Greymouth</u> CPH acknowledges that the complexity and costs of keeping the Port in a safe and workable state will require increased ratepayer support.</p> <p>However, as the Port sustains economic activity and will be a vital access point in linking our community in the event of a natural disaster closing the Alpine passes, we support Council's commitment to increase the slipway and Port facilities levels of service. Improvements to the Port may also make sea-freight a more viable option. This would assist our district in reducing our greenhouse gas emissions.</p> <p><u>Retirement Housing</u> We applaud Council's continued provision of well-maintained, comfortable and affordable retirement housing, as the units provide accommodation for the housing disadvantaged within our older population. Provision of this service is becoming more essential as there is a growing lack of 'step-down' accommodation available for older residents of the district.</p>	
<p>Community & Recreation</p>	<p>We agree that access to a wide range of services makes a district attractive to both residents and visitors. Facilities such as swimming pools, libraries and parks offer people opportunities to learn, be active and connect with each other and the environment which benefits wellbeing and quality of life. We therefore endorse Council's activity in this section, however, we make the following comments with</p>	

	<p>respect to specific activities.</p> <p><u>Libraries</u></p> <p>We support Council's intention to plan for a new library to provide for future needs of the community. We agree that libraries are becoming more of a community hub where people can learn, interact with new and old technologies, and connect with other members of the community.</p> <p>We support the idea of incorporating museum displays as this links the present with the past.</p> <p>While we understand Council's preference for freehold land we believe it is more imperative that the library is sited within or immediately adjacent to the CBD. Library facilities are among the anchor points of most CBDs: they attract residents and visitors, encourage foot traffic and add to the vibrancy of the area.</p> <p>We encourage Council to visit and investigate other community libraries and their services during the planning stages of the new library. Incorporating areas such as a 'make a space' where people of all ages can interact with and learn to use new (and sometimes old) technologies provides learning opportunities and experiences for people who may be unable to access via other pathways. Supporting learning and creativity has social, cultural, environmental and often economic benefits to the wider community.</p> <p>While we support the development of a new district library we are concerned that people in the Runanga area will lose their local service. We are unaware how many people use the Runanga community library, however, it cannot be assumed that people who</p>	
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	<p>travel to town for other things will also be able to use the town library. As there is almost no public transport, many people, particularly older people, rely on family and friends for transport to and from shops and appointments. Having to also fit in a library visit may make library access too difficult for some. There are models in some communities where libraries have a relationship with the local school. We suggest this would be worth investigating if the Service Centre is closed.</p> <p><u>Swimming pools</u> Provision of swimming pool services provide an opportunity for people to be active, learn new skills and connect with others. We acknowledge Council has lowered the cost of swims for some vulnerable members of the community. This will assist in addressing financial accessibility.</p> <p>We understand that swimming pools are provided as a service to the community. They are rarely, if ever, cost neutral. It is generally accepted that they run at a loss and are at least part-funded by ratepayers. Pools with a gym/sports centre attached, such as the Westland Recreation Centre, have more ability to off-set some of the costs. However, both need to be run with experienced and qualified staff with a commitment to delivering high-quality service to fit the needs of the local community.</p> <p>With respect to the signalled closure of Runanga pool, feedback from a small discussion with community members has indicated that the pool patronage could be improved with better opening times and targeting. For example, running of events in the past has brought people in the area, and beyond, to the pool. The pool has also been the back-stop facility when the pool at the Westland Recreation</p>	
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	<p>Centre has been out of action. We are concerned that people in Runanga may be not be able to afford the entry fee and travel cost to use the pool at the Recreation Centre. We are also concerned that the community may not have the capacity to take over and run the pool as suggested in the LTP. Prior to making a long-term decision we suggest it may be beneficial for Council to work with the community to see how it (Council) can improve its service delivery with the pool and meet community needs before deciding to divest itself of the facility.</p> <p><u>Arts, Heritage and Culture</u> Access to cultural amenities connects people to their past, celebrates creativity and assists with developing a community identity.</p> <p>We support Council's activity to open a new pop-up museum within the CBD as it will add another point of interest to our CBD. The previous pop-up museum attracted both locals and visitors and we expect that the new pop-up will also do that. We are pleased to see Council is working with Te Papa Museum Development Advisors to identify and implement appropriate storage environments for its museum collection.</p> <p><u>Parks and Tracks</u> Parks and tracks offer places for people to be active and connect with other and the natural environment, all of which benefits individual and community wellbeing. We support Council's intention to maintain its parks and tracks to a good standard. However, we are concerned Council anticipates a drop in customer satisfaction levels. This indicates a drop in the level of service. We understand a recent review undertaken by the Health Promotion and Policy Research Unit, University of Otago, Wellington, and funded by the Cancer Society,</p>

	<p>looked at sun-shade provision within children’s playgrounds across New Zealand. The review found the Grey District in the lower band of provision. We encourage Council to undertake accessibility audits for its children’s playgrounds to add to the information provided in the shade review, and to use this as a means to creating a plan to improve its playground and park facilities.</p> <p><u>Public Toilets</u> We support Council’s commitment to improve service delivery for public restrooms as this activity protects the health of residents, visitors and the environment. We support the proposed new toilet at Mitchells and the improvements to the toilets at Iveagh Bay.</p>	
<p>Democracy & Administration</p>	<p>We support Councils rationale for activities under this section especially its involvement in projects that ensure the Grey District is a vibrant, progressive and welcoming environment.</p> <p>We particularly support Council’s commitment <i>‘to seek community engagement in all matters that are important or dear to them and to consider inputs carefully and constructively.’</i> This is apparent in the creation of the vision and community outcomes consultation undertaken to inform the draft LTP.</p> <p><u>CBD Redevelopment</u> During the consultation phase of the CBD Revitalisation Plan (and the many previous plans for the CBD) community members and stakeholders identified that the area needs to have more trees and green spaces. Given the recent loss of a semi-mature tree within the CBD we would like to see Council work with appropriately qualified people to develop a more formalised approach to maintenance and</p>	

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	<p>protection of the trees within the CBD. These trees are an asset to the CBD, they make the space more attractive and, with appropriate maintenance, they will provide a spring-board for further greening of the area as per the recommendations of the Plan.</p> <p>The Redevelopment Plan also recommended more visible recognition of our pre-colonial history should be evident within the CBD. We would like to see this part of the project progressed to acknowledge the unique story behind the CBD and to uplift the mana of manawhenua o Māwhera.</p> <p>We agree that Council facilitated events provide vibrancy and enhance community wellbeing. Please also refer to our comments under Environmental Services regarding Smokefree events.</p>	
<p>Food Security</p>	<p>Council was involved in workshops hosted by Community and Public Health a few years ago to scope how lack of food security is affecting our communities.</p> <p>When people are food secure, it means they have access to a variety of nutritious food that is safe, meets their cultural needs and supports them to live active healthy lives. When people are healthy and well, that in turn can lead to better participation in society. However, one in four New Zealand children are not currently food secure and local qualitative research indicates a similar situation for the West Coast.</p> <p>While this issue coincides on a national level with insufficient access to resources such as disposable income, transport options, fuel and warm housing, on the West Coast many people are further bound by geographical isolation from the largest food stores, fewer options of</p>	

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	<p>where they can buy local food produce, and a likely overall higher cost of food than in the rest of New Zealand.</p> <p>The West Coast Food Security Network is looking at short and long-term solutions for West Coast people and whānau who are food insecure on a daily or weekly basis. This has included local research with communities (report due out later in 2021), connecting existing sustainable initiatives across the West Coast such as community edible gardens and other food supply initiatives, and strengthening support for people who require more food on a daily or weekly basis. Some of these initiatives may also feed into the West Coast Emergency Management Team Coordination over time.</p> <p>New strategies to improve food security will need to be mana-enhancing (i.e. they support the aspirations of whānau who are food insecure by enabling them to set and accomplish their own goals which align with their values). Many levels of support are currently required, including from national and local government and local communities, to make space for communities to support positive change. Food Bank Aotearoa is one initiative visiting the West Coast in 2021 seeking to explore how they could replicate their model for food rescue and redistribution for the West Coast. This approach could help to strengthen the supply of food as well as save space in the landfill via connections with local food suppliers and producers. Coordination with local Councils, various agencies, community members and local iwi would be needed to ensure approaches can extend and evolve over time to wrap around whānau receiving the kai so their aspirations and goals are met.</p>	<p>We invite Council to reconnect with the Food Security Network. The next meeting will be held at Whare Manaaki on Tainui Street on the 24th of May from 1 to 2-30pm</p>

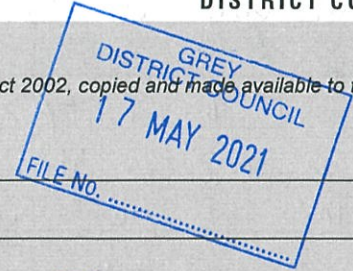

KEY ISSUE 2: New Library

Moving the library out of the CBD will further erode the vibrancy of the CBD.

I would question the the long term thinking of moving the library out of the CBD, when council have spent tens of thousands of dollars on consultants and reports (albeit via the governments PGF) as well as engaging community organizations to assist with the revitalization of the CBD, for council to then potentially remove one community facility impacting on both the library and CBD.

The LTP consultation document refers to "... it does get a lot of foot traffic" - though doesn't expand

on whether the foot traffic is due to the library, or as a consequence of its location in the CBD and the library is a beneficiary of its location?

Either way moving the library away from the CBD will impact on both.

I recall the original plans for the Recreation Centre build incorporated meeting room /coworking space - though council saw fit to remove this from the final design. Ironic now "meeting space" is one of the reasons for an expanded library!?

Being involved in various community organizations, meeting space has never been an issue. There are plenty of options currently available.

council chambers, polytech, core.. to name a few.

There are plenty of options for the redevelopment of the existing site, or other options within the CBD.

There are plenty of people within the community with creative solutions. Maybe engage with people to come up with the solutions at the beginning, instead of consulting on limited options at the end.

KEY ISSUE 3: Delivery of Spring Creek Pool Service

I would support the retention of the pool though management through other means than council.

However with council contributing financially long term.

I am skeptical of the "data" mentioned in the LTP consultation document as it only ever mentions portions that supports councils case, and is not fully disclosing all the data, for an informed decision.

I note council has spent millions on establishing the town square, and observationally the council managed facility gets little to no use on a day to day basis, however council employs an events coordinator charged with organizing and facilitating events at the town square, in order to encourage its use. Has this opportunity be offered to other non- Greymouth based council managed facilities?

Will council be applying the same criteria to the town square and other facilities with "low patronage"?

I would recommend:

a) investigating the viability and feasibility of operating the pool over longer period than is currently, with the view of hosting or housing aquatic activities (community/sporting/commercial) not currently catered to (or could better cater to those existing aquatic activities) at Runanga.

b) should operating the pool for longer, as above not prove viable/feasible to investigate the construction of temporary floor covering over the pool, to convert the pool to a multi-use facility. during the "off season"

The facility would operate as a aquatic centre/pool during "summer season", and with the addition of temporary flooring to become a multipurpose venue,

which could house sporting events, social enterprises, markets, makerspace, (which isn't catered for when the Runanga Miners Hall is operational) when not required as a pool.

KEY ISSUE 4: Runanga Service Centre and Community Library

I would support the disposing of the building with proceeds returned to the Runanga community, with services including the library (in whatever form that may be) transferred to the Miners Hall when renovations completed.

I would question how actively council have been in managing the Runanga library other than "manning" the site? I note the number of "sessions/classes" being offered at the Grey District Library? how many of these have been offered at the Runanga Library?

How much effort has council put in to make the Runanga library a community library or has it been neglected and left on its own?

The "...its only 7km away" to Greymouth is a favorite and common excuse throughout the LTP consultation document, as to why services should be closed and centralized. However that argument works both ways.....its only 7km for one or two staff members to travel to Runanga to deliver services to the community. Seven kilometers may not be a long distance for those with access to transport, but for those aged under 16, disabled, without transport or elderly, 7km is a long way.

With councils intent on withdrawing services like libraries and pools in smaller centres, council isn't supporting communities, it's merely converting towns into residential suburbs of Greymouth. Once those facilities are gone - they're gone for good, they'll never come back.

Whilst council have financial responsibilities they also have responsibilities to communities to look at every possible option to support communities and not rely on

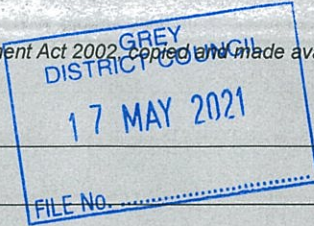

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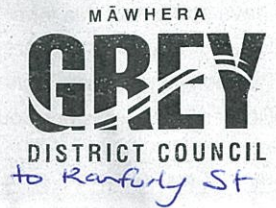

At our general meeting, 13th May,

Members raised concern over the suggestion of a new library and the possibly of it being relocated out of the CBD. Those concerns are further listed below. Following this discussion a motion was called.

Motion: BPA put forward submission to LT Plan supporting option2 - “Don’t proceed with building a new library, i.e. status quo”

M:Mequa - 2nd Cassandra

Passed – unanimously.

While we think an upgrade and a modernisation of the Library to attract greater visitation is a wonderful project, several concerns are raised. It would be preferable for good decision making to have more information around the many details both fiscally, and the way the ROI is projected.

Current data on municipal Libraries is a continued decline in Library use into the future, with new Libraries having scant resemblance to the current Library. In the Long term Plan, the content of this project is at such a high level, it is difficult to envisage the intent or consider the benefits and to who.

Residents still rate their library very highly with satisfaction levels reaching 97% in the most recent GDC Resident Satisfaction Survey. This questions the actual need.

There is some surprise that additional meeting space would be seen a driver for this project. Our Society has not been informed of any shortage of meeting space, and with our new BYTE hub, we have added to our current stock.

While we sympathise with the team at the Library it seems possibly a more frugal way can be found to accommodate their space requirements for a tea room.

There is some concern as to the stipulation that the land for this new Library be on freehold land. This may suggest that the Library is moved from the current and long-standing CBD precinct. This seems a huge conflict with all the town planning consultants’ reports, that support the retention of “service centres” within the CBD.

If, however this is a way of gaining support to purchase the land where Revingtons Hotel once stood, (being freehold land within the CBD) it would then seem the council moves into an area, property development. This requires a different skill set, and more understanding would be required as to the vision this strategy would support.

Ultimately this is a very big 14 million dollar legacy project, with very little detail provided to form a considered decision. The status quo option doesn't exclude a similar project being completed once a more thorough due diligence was completed.

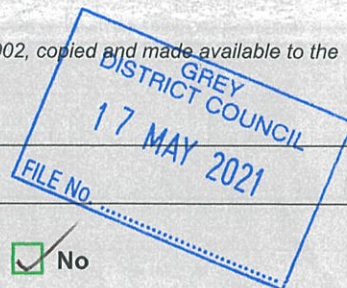
