PURPOSE:

To report on the administration of Council's Dog Control Policy and Practices for the period 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2019.

BACKGROUND:

Section 10A of the Dog Control Act requires territorial authorities to publicly report each financial year on:

- The administration of their dog control policy and their dog control practices (Section 10A(1)); and
- A variety of dog control related statistics (Section 10A(2)).

While not explicitly stated in the Dog Control Act, one of the primary purposes for preparing this report is to allow communities to see how Council is managing its dog control responsibilities.

STAFFING:

Two full-time Dog Control Officers are responsible for a medium residential area and large rural area covering 350,900 hectares with 620 kilometres of roadway (this does not include the two state highways running through the district.)

During the reporting period, the Grey District had a total of 2766 dogs

POLICY ON DOGS:

The provisions of the Dog Policy has been applied in a consistent, fair and objective manner. Staff at all times endeavoured to assist dog owners wherever possible and to focus on dogs not posing a risk or nuisance to others. The excellent cooperation received from so many dog owners and members of the public is herewith acknowledged.

SERVICES INCLUDED:

Education

During this reporting period pamphlets and brochures concerning being safe around dogs and control of dogs where distributed to all pre-schools and primary schools in the district.

The Council website is easy to follow and kept updated with an Animal Management page that outlines responsibilities for dog owners, contains a Dog Owner's Manual, guide to microchipping, registration information and the current fees and charges. This website is also used to make educational material available for dog owners and members of the public.

Dogs Prohibited and Dog Exercise Areas

The Cobden dog park exercise area continues to be extremely popular with local dog owners. Many dog owners in the area also attend a regular early morning local community walk on the weekends from the dog park and along the nearby local beach.

The dog park exercise area on the outskirts of the Central Business District in Greymouth continues to be extremely popular with a lot of use over the wetter winter months as the park has a covered shelter for dog owners to stay dry under. The Greymouth park also has equipment which has had a lot of use from both local and visiting dog owners to the area.

DOG CONTROL PRACTICES:

All aspects regarding the regulation of dogs has been dealt with in a cooperative, helpful manner with the focus on being pro-active where possible. The following represents a summary of Councils Dog Control function's regulatory performance for the year.
