MINUTE NO.5 ON HEARING HOUSEKEEPING Dated 18 December 2023

- 1 This Minute aims to inform the parties about hearing planning developments.
- Ms Barrow provided the Panel with an indicative timetable for the four scheduled hearing days. Given the scope of evidence by the applicant and submitters, the program looked tight. Therefore, the Panel has arranged an additional two days of hearing time on 12 and 13 February 2024. That will provide some insurance that there is sufficient time to hear the Council's reports and sufficient latitude within the timetable for Panel members' questioning and use of the applicant's experts at the end of the hearing to clarify matters arising during the hearing recognising that issues concerning the tāiko species and its habitat will not be fully analysed until Ms Simister gives her evidence.
- The Panel has yet to finalise a date for Ms Simister's evidence by AVL but has asked the Director-General of Conservation to present any legal submissions and other evidence so that any legal argument has exposure during the scheduled hearing process. If necessary, the submissions can be supplemented later when Ms Simister gives evidence.
- The Panel and the parties need to be somewhat flexible about the schedule, including inserting experts out of order to accommodate these adjustments.
- The Panel has not received any advice about tikanga or other cultural matters but is open to meeting any Council protocols or Mana Whakahono a Rohe, which could include a hearing opening by Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Waewae. Discussions on this could perhaps be performed directly by Councils, and the Panel will follow that lead.
