Submission:

I strongly oppose the application by TiGa for permission to mine the Barrytown Flats. I would like the council to deny the application.

My reasons are these:

Angela Goddard

- the disruption to a currently peaceful part of the world by the noise, dust and dirt caused by mining.
- the effects of the large number of trucks all day, late in the evenings and early in the
 mornings, 7 days a week, making driving at least less pleasant and at worst dangerous. The
 noise of heavily laden trucks would be an unwanted addition to the sounds which we enjoy,
 of birdsong and the sound of the sea, particularly to the many houses situated close to the
 Coast Road. The beauty of a quiet evening at dusk under the stars would be rudely
 interrupted by passing trucks.
- the fact that these trucks (I understand) will run on diesel, at a time when we should all be focusing on an effort to avert the effects of climate change. This, I believe, is of immense importance, when I feel it is our duty to future generations to avoid contributing to Global Warming.
- the inevitable wear and tear to the road surfaces caused by the heavy trucks, resulting in more hold-ups while repair work is undertaken, more expense, and more work for an already stretched Waka Kotahi.
- the well-known risk to the endangered Westland Petrel, while on their flight path to the sea becoming confused by lights at the mine or on the road.
- the inevitable loss to the various small industries along the Coast Road, due to the degradation of the area and increased traffic, making it less appealing to tourists.

These are my main objections to the mining of the Barrytown Flats, although I know there are many more (concerning emissions from the mining work, consequences of the disturbance of the land, and the possible discharges into the close-by creeks, for instance) which I am unable to address through lack of appropriate expertise.
